In 1952, at 18 months of age, Sue Thomas suffered an instantaneous and total loss of hearing. The reason still remains unknown. In spite of the learning difficulties this caused, Sue Thomas graduated from Springfield College in Massachusetts with a degree in Political Science and International Affairs. Not long after graduating, Sue was hired by the FBI and assigned to work in undercover surveillance reading lips for the FBI agents in Washington DC.

She authored the book, "Silent Night," which in turn inspired the TV series, "Sue Thomas F.B.Eye," which debuted in 2002. During this time, Sue was also in high demand as a motivational speaker. But in 2001, on her way to a speaking engagement in Dallas, Sue felt a numbness creeping up from her fingers to the top of her head. She managed to deliver her speech to 10,000 people before going to the emergency room. She was diagnosed with Multiple Sclerosis.

Living with MS has become one of Sue's greatest challenges. "Fighting it is a waste of precious energy," she says. "It is only by embracing my MS that I learn life's greatest lessons."
